The Children's Garden Director Report August 2022

- Twelve new parent meetings took place during the month of August. The new parent meetings are mandatory. This is an opportunity for the administration to have an informal meeting to discuss specific components of the program. This includes the partnership between the center and the church.
- During the month of August, the center prepares for the fall program. This includes
 many different opportunities for the children to prepare for their new classrooms. In
 our infant and toddler departments, the teachers strive to provide the children with the
 opportunity to build relationships with their new teachers. The program intentionally
 sets up specific times for teachers to visit the children in their classroom environment
 prior to the transition for the fall session. The PS department provides children several
 opportunities to visit their new classrooms to meet the teachers and become familiar
 with their new classroom. Parents are provided a transition observation sheet after each
 visit.
- All fall packets were distributed to the families on August 17th.
- The building was open for teachers to prepare their classrooms for the beginning of the fall session on August 29th. Our dedicated staff take pride in our classrooms. All classrooms were ready for the first day of the fall program.
- Pastor Sarah supported the program by researching a new Christian education for our classrooms. The curriculum included classrooms from infant through School Age. The teachers were very excited to view the resources and are ready to get started in presenting the curriculum to the children.
- Our department mentor meeting took place on August 8th. The focal point of this meeting was the current COVID plan and fall staff placement.

August already! It's hard to believe that the





AUGUST: CHILDREN'S EYE HEALTH & SAFETY MONTH



It is reported that 1 in 4 children experience vision problems. Here's a link to the American Optometric Academy's important vision milestones and sign of eye and vision problems. Infant Vision:: Healthy eyes and good vision play a critical role in how infants and children learn to see. Babies learn to see over a period, much like they learn to walk and talk. They are not born with all the visual abilities they need in life. Eye and vision problems in infants can cause developmental delays. It is important to detect any problems early to ensure babies have the opportunity to develop the visual abilities they need to grow and learn.

<u>BABIES FIRST EYE EXAM:</u> Even if no eye or vision problems are apparent, at about age 6 months, you should take your baby to a Doctor of Optometry for his or her first thorough eye exam. Eye health problems are not common, but if present early detection and treatment offer the best option.

<u>STEPS IN INFANT VISION DEVELOPMENT:</u> At birth, babies can't see as well as older children or adults. Their eyes and visual system aren't fully developed. The following are milestones to watch for in vision and child development.

BIRTH TO 4 MONTHS: At birth, babies' vision is abuzz with all kinds of visual stimulation. Their primary focus is on objects 8 to 10 inches from their face or the distance to the parent's face. During the first months of life, the eyes start working together and vision rapidly improves. By eight weeks, babies begin to focus their eyes more easily on the faces of a parent or other person near them. For the first two months of life, an infant's eyes are not well coordinated and may appear to wander or to be crossed. This is usually normal. However, if an eye appears to turn in or out constantly, an evaluation is warranted. Babies should begin to follow moving objects with their eyes and reach for things at around three months of age.

<u>5 to 8 MONTHS:</u> During these months, control of eye movements and eye-body coordination skills continue to improve. Depth perception is not present at birth. It is not until around the fifth month that the eyes can work together to form a three-dimensional view of the world an begin to see in-depth. It is generally believed that babies have good color vision by 5 months of age. Most babies start crawling at about 8 months old, which help further develop eye-hand-foot-body coordination. Early walkers who did minimal crawling may not learn to use their eyes together as well as babies who crawl a lot.

9 to 12 MONTHS: At around 9 months, babies begin to pull themselves up to a standing position. By 10 months, a baby should be able to grasp objects with thumb and forefinger. By 12 months of age, most babies will be crawling and trying to walk. Parents should encourage crawling rather than early walking to help the child develop better eye-hand coordination. Babies can now judge distances well and throw things with precision.

<u>1 to 2 YEARS:</u> By 2 years of age, a child's eye-hand coordination and depth perception should be well developed. Children this age are highly interested in exploring their environment and in looking and listening. They recognize familiar objects and pictures in books and can scribble with crayons or pencils.

<u>SIGNS OF EYE AND VISION PROBLEMS:</u> The presence of and vision problems in infants is rare. Most babies begin life with healthy eyes and start to develop the visual abilities they will need throughout life without difficulty. But occasionally, eye health and vision problems can develop. Parents need to look for the following signs that may be indicators of eye and vision problems:

- *Excessive tearing may indicate blocked tear ducts.
- *Red or encrusted eyelids could be a sign of an eye infection.
- *Constant eye turning may signal a problem with eye muscle control.
- *Extreme sensitivity to light may indicate an elevated pressure in the eye.
- *The appearance of a white pupil may indicate the presence of eye cancer.

The appearance of any of these signs should require immediate attention by a Doctor of Optometry.

WHAT PARENTS CAN DO TO HELP WITH VISUAL DEVELOPMENT

Parents can help their baby's vision develop properly by providing age-appropriate activities that can assist an infant's visual development. The following are some examples:

BIRTH TO 4 MONTHS:

- *Use a nightlight in the baby's room.
- *Change the crib's position frequently.
- *Keep reach & touch toys with the baby's focus.
- *Talk to the baby while walking around the room.
- *Alternate right and left side with each feeding.

5 TO 8 MONTHS:

- *Hang a mobile, crib gym for the baby to grab, pull, and kick.
- *Give baby plenty of floor play and exploration.
- *Provide age-appropriate blocks that can be held in the hands.
- *Play patty-cake or other games, moving the baby's hand through the motions.

9 to 12 MONTHS:

- *Play hide & seek games with toys to help the baby develop visual memory.
- *Name objects when talking to encourage the baby's word association and vocabulary development skills.
- *Encourage crawling and creeping.

1 to 2 YEARS:

- *Roll a ball back and forth to help the child track objects with the eyes visually.
- *Give the child building blocks and balls of all shapes and sizes to play with to boost fine motor skills and small muscle development.
- * Read or tell stories to stimulate the child's ability to visualize and pave the way for learning and reading skills.


